## WHY PLAY??

### PLAY STIMULATES BRAIN DEVELOPMENT

When you watch young children while playing, you likely notice them using skills like focus, self-control and problem-solving. As it turns out, these are the very essence of "executive functioning"--a collection of mental skills that help children regulate behavior and manage emotions. Research shows that play provides the ideal context for nurturing these important abilities.

#### **FOSTERS SELF-REGULATION**

Engaging in make-believe, following rules in games and finishing creative projects requires children to control and manage their behavior.




#### SPARKS CREATIVITY AND NOVELTY-SEEKING

The open-ended nature of play encourages children to try new ideas, strategies and approaches - stretching their minds.

#### STRENGTHENS WORKING MEMORY

Remembering the sequence of events in pretend scenarios, following multi-step instructions in activities and tracking the movement of objects in games exercises working memory.



#### **BOOSTS COGNITIVE FLEXIBILITY**

Switching roles in pretend play, coming up with alternative solutions in building tasks, and modifying plans on-the-fly demands flexible thinking.



#### DEVELOPS FOCUS AND ATTENTION

When play is intrinsically motivating, children can sustain attention for longer periods, strengthening this core self-control skill.



The next time your child engages in imaginative play, board games, blockbuilding or creative art, see beyond the surface fun. Play provides a joyful context for children to exercise and develop the underlying skills that are essential for school readiness, learning and life.
